

The Minister's Pastoral Letter for October

Dear Friends,

Last month, Sunday after Sunday, we prayed and meditated on the theme of caring for creation. It was the Season of Creation, a time in the Christian year dedicated to environmental issues, but also and above all a time to give thanks to God for the environment we have been given to flourish.

During the Season of Creation, some members of our Pastorate expressed the fact that we could do more in our churches for recycling. Now that the recycling industry is up and running across the country, it's sad to see the bins in our churches filled indiscriminately, mixing what can be recycled with what cannot. We all remember the images from documentaries of news reports of unrecycled British rubbish being exported to poor countries in Africa and Asia. We have also become aware that the accumulation of plastic in rivers and oceans has generated a huge floating mass of plastic in the Pacific Ocean. Turtles, which feed on jellyfish, mistake them for plastic bags. They choke and die. The environmental damage is heartbreaking. So instead of mourning this situation, which seems so massive and uncontrollable, we choose to do something, a small gesture in our daily lives, to oppose these huge movements of waste. It's a healthy response that comes from Christian hope. Christian hope is linked to a fight for justice, for the weak and the oppressed. Behind it is the image of Christ who bends down to the sick, the marginalized, the oppressed, to heal them, to reintegrate them to lift them up.

Recycling is one of the things we can do to alleviate the ecological crisis, along with many others: reducing our consumption of meat and animal products to preserve animal lives; limiting our use of oil, fuel and transport where we can; these are the main causes of greenhouse gas emissions worldwide. We can make a gesture by replacing animal products with more vegetables, seeds and legumes in

our diet, by avoiding food waste, by avoiding private cars in favour of public transport, cycling and walking if we can. However, even if we do all this – which is already great – as Western individuals we will still be over-consuming fossil fuels. It's up to the government to do the rest. We need to vote for more aggressive environmental policies than we have had in the past.

So as Christians we say yes to small gestures like recycling that make a difference on a large scale, but we also say yes to big gestures that act on a national scale: courageous, bold and unpopular government policies that we can embrace and support through our faith in Christ.

I hope you all enjoy the beauty of the autumn season.

Today an article on the news was about the abuse public facing workers encounter. That we should personalise the staff, imagine if it was our children working or other family members how would we feel about how they are being treated by the public, on the end of our frustration.

I have a confession that when a self service check out did not register a reduced price label, I wanted to alert the shop that the system was not working properly. I now feel guilty I could have been too assertive towards the staff.

Well, it is the same with God. If God was a family member how would we feel about God being ignored, abused by only being called upon to get us out of trouble, then forgotten, being blamed for disasters that could have been avoided, e.g. not living in an earthquake zone or floodplain. Aircraft maintenance or building regulations being short cut or inspection reports not being acted on.

God who loves us beyond our understanding, is not a hammer only to be used when things need fixing, God wants to share every part of our lives so we can learn, improve, and enjoy our lives better,

Why do People Stop Going to Church?

I think we have heard all the old arguments in answer to the above question. They usually revolve around more weekend attractions, busy lives, more interesting things to do and boring services with, out -of- date music etc. However, I believe the answer is more fundamental. Could it be that an increasing number of people no longer believe in God?

If questioned why they no longer believe, they will cite the absence of God in such disasters as the Grenfell Tower fire. The failure of God to intervene in the wars taking place in Gaza, Ukraine and Sudan. I have also heard as an answer, that God allowed his 'chosen people' to be slaughtered in the holocaust. It is also easy for people to become disillusioned when confronted by a major illness and a feeling that God doesn't answer their prayers.

I do not discount the affect of the prominent atheist authors, Richard Dawkins and Christopher Hitchens whose books have sold in their millions. It doesn't help that both authors were well versed in scripture. Who can quantify the extent of these two influencers on former believers?

While Christianity might appear to be in decline, the opposite seems to be the case with Islam. You may wonder why I refer to another religion, but there are similarities in the two faiths. Both religions believe in one God. There is also belief in many prophets, but one message. Both make reference to the Day of Judgement. Islam is more disciplined than Christianity, it requires its followers to pray five times a day and follow the strictures of Ramadan with its fasting from sunrise to sunset. To some critics Christianity would appear somewhat woolly compared with the apparent certainty and discipline of Islam.

So, how does the church at large answer these searching questions in a way that still make the existence of God relevant? It is easy for me to pose the question to which I have no immediate answers. However, I did admire the answer of a Catholic priest to Margaret Margolyes in a recent television programme. She said she no longer believed in God – 'Tell me about this God you do not believe in', replied the priest. It may be the right response for the beginning of a valuable dialogue.

We choose. We choose God. Amen.





What started as peaceful protests on university campuses transformed into nationwide unrest. The government imposed a massive communications blackout, shutting down the internet and phone services.

University students were protesting a quota system for government jobs. A third of public sector jobs are reserved for the relatives of veterans from the war for independence in 1971. Students have argued that the system is discriminatory. Most people in the country agree.
