The Minister's Pastoral Letter for May

Dear Friends,

This year, on Saturday 7th June, we are holding our Pastorate Away Day* on the theme of Eco-Church. We will be reflecting on how we can renew our commitment as a congregation to the environment. I know that some things have been put in place over the last few years in our three congregations. I know that none of us would question good practices that have been put in place over the years. Certain measures have become standard practice. Recycling paper or plastic is no longer a choice that shows people's good will, but a rule that everyone must apply.

In Christianity, awareness of the ecological crisis began in March 1967 when a Catholic theologian, Lynn White, said in an article in the journal Science that 'Christianity is the most anthropocentric religion the world has seen' (Lynn White (1967), 'The Historical Roots of Our Ecological Crisis', *Science* 155 (37) p.1203-1207). In other words, the ecological problem stems largely from an understanding of our environment that is too focused on ourselves as humans. Everything cannot revolve around us alone. We are part of an environment without which we cannot live and in which other creatures live. It's a question of justice. The political and economic responses that have been given to this ecological crisis over the last 60 years are inadequate and lack continuity. They are too easily sacrificed when other crises appear that are deemed more urgent.

As the environmental movement has grown, new disciplines have emerged, such as ecotheology, a branch of theology that deals with the environmental crisis The international organisation to which Eco Church belongs is called A Rocha. It was founded in 1983. Eco Church encourages and evaluates local churches. It suggests as

number of good ecological practices and gives awards based on the commitment of the congregations.

In my life as a Christian, I wanted to deepen my commitment to the environment a few years ago. I've always felt very concerned by the problems of pollution and climate change. But one thing particularly bothered me: the fate of farm animal theology and discovered that our civilisation perpetuates traditions of cruelty towards animals that are not founded in God's love, nor in line with his will for his creatures. We kill animals on a massive scale to eat them, when we have no need to do so. We do it only for our gustatory pleasure, and a little for our nutrition of course, but in reality it is not necessary for our life or our health. We all need nutrients, but not meat or dairy products. Everything we need to thrive is available in the plant kingdom.

Because we live in an age where everything has been industrialised and is mass-produced, animals, their lives and their bodies, are treated like commodities. Our urban lifestyle does not allow us to see this. Those who trade in animal bodies are careful not to show the bloodiest stages. And then we are able to desensitise ourselves. It's a horrible thought, but it's our reality: we are capable of blinding ourselves to the ugly or immoral things we do, in order to preserve our conscience. This whole system of exploiting animals and desensitising ourselves to their suffering needs to be deconstructed and abolished. In the kingdom of peace that Jesus shows us and makes us approach, these things no longer exist.

I hope many of you will be able to make it at the Pastorate Away Day* and wish you all an excellent Easter season!

Judas Iscariot

Most people would understand what the term 'Judas' was, even if they did not know its derivation. It would imply betrayal or treachery. As Christians, we know it refers to Judas Iscariot, who betrayed Jesus to the Sanhedrin in the Garden of Gethsemane.


The intriguing question is; 'Why did he do it?' Judas was one of the twelve apostles and must have heard the wise words spoken by Jesus and witnessed many miracles performed by him. Judas would have realised that Jesus was more than an itinerant preacher but perhaps he was not going to be the expected Messiah, who would lead a national rebellion against the rule of Rome. Surely, he would not have acted as he did if he believed Jesus was the' Son of God'.

Judas was already a bit of an outsider as the only apostle who came from the South of the country. Maybe his disappointment about Jesus not being a rebel leader led him to accept the 30 pieces of silver offered by the temple priests. However, his action led inevitably to the crucifixion. It was this outcome that brought about his feeling of guilt and remorse and suicide by hanging. The 30 pieces of silver had been returned to the Chief Priest and used to purchase a field to be used for the burial of strangers and henceforth known as 'The Field of Blood'.

Jesus had indicated at the Last Supper that he knew he was about to be betrayed and would have known that he would die an agonising death. Yet without this sacrifice there would not have been the salvation of humanity. We believe, as Christians that Jesus died to atone for our sins. So, was Judas merely a pawn in the grand plan?

The cross has become the ultimate symbol for Christianity and what would seem to be the end of the mission of Jesus became its beginning with millions of followers all over the world.

Lord, for tomorrow and its needs, I do not pray

This is not a hymn that I know or have sung, but the above line was given to me recently and I have done a little research. The words of this hymn were written in the early morning hours of 1877 by Sister Mary Xavier while attending the bedside of an elderly nun whose life was ebbing away. In time, Sister Mary Xavier sent the words of the hymn to her mother, who had them published in the January issue of the Messenger of the Sacred Heart 1880 and is the earliest known publication of the hymn to exist.

The verses reflect the words of Our Lord, "Enough then, of worrying about tomorrow. Let tomorrow take care of itself. Today has troubles enough of its own" (Matt. 6:34). The words are slightly different in GNB! A number of tunes have been composed over the years but I like the one by Horatio R. Palmer which can be heard on You Tube

Lord for tomorrow and its needs
I do not pray;
Keep me, my God, from stain of sin
Just for today.
Help me to labour earnestly,
And duly pray;
Let me be kind in word and deed,
Father today.

Let me be slow to do my will, Prompt to obey; Help me to sacrifice myself, Father, today. Let me no wrong or idle word Unthinking say; Set Thou a seal up on my lips Through all today.

Let me in season, Lord, be grave, In season gay; Let me be faithful to Thy grace, Father, today.
Lord, for tomorrow and its needs
I do not pray;
Still keep me, guide me, love me, Lord,
Through each today. Amen.


