

The Minister's Pastoral Letter for September

Dear Friends,



The story of our lives can be written in linear time: time passing, years going by and accumulating. But our lives are also part of a cyclical time: the clock that ticks and brings us back to the same time every 24 hours, the week that brings us back to the same day, and the year that brings us back to the same month. As we watch time pass, see ourselves grow older and lose something we will never regain, sadness can take hold of our minds. The tradition of the Church offers a response to this. When cycles return, new beginnings are celebrated. This is true of the beginning of the year, which coincides with the Nativity of Christ, spring, which coincides with the Resurrection, and – a recent addition to the tradition – the celebration of Creation in September. This liturgical season is not old. It is becoming widespread in churches around the world. It is gaining momentum as awareness of the ecological crisis grows.

Creation is a magnificent doctrine of Christianity. To be honest, it is not specific to Christianity, but Christianity has a special approach to it. All the world's religions have some kind of creation story, a story that answers the question we have all asked ourselves at one time or another: 'How did everything around us come to be?' Biblical commentators say that the creation story we find in Genesis 1 owes much to that of the Babylonians. My Old Testament professor said that it was the greatest moment of happiness in the Bible. Everything is put in place by God so that God's creatures may live happily and always flourish. The first chapter of Genesis is a peaceful text, in which there is no deception, violence, sin or murder (all of which appear on the next page...). The biblical account of Creation tells us something essential: we did not create ourselves, nor did we create the environment in which we live (even if the cities and artificial environment in which we live would have us believe otherwise...). When we look around us with the eyes of faith in the One who created us, we are filled with a single emotion: gratitude.

Contemplating Creation leads us to recognize the greatness and magnificence, the power of love and goodness that created us. This emotion cancels out the sadness I mentioned in the first lines of this letter. Thus, the beginning of a new school year while celebrating Creation in September is a joyful time. Even though it tells us that a year has passed, in faith it reminds us of the importance of living in gratitude, for we are the recipients of a gift that we can never offer or return to the One who gave it to us: life.

I wish you and your families, especially the children and young people, an excellent start to the new school year.

The Unbelievers

Recently, the Rev. Ian Gow spoke in his sermon about the unbelievers . This led me to think about two of the most prominent unbelievers or atheists, if you prefer. They are Professor Richard Dawkins in this country and a fellow Englishman, Christopher Hitchens in the USA. Both of them, wrote books, which attacked religion and belief in God. Dawkins' book, The God Delusion, and Hitchen's book, God is not Great, sold thousands of copies around the world and were probably responsible for many people losing any faith in God or religion.

Dawkins is an Emeritus Professor of New College, Oxford and was formerly Professor of Public Understanding of Science at Oxford University from 1990 to 2006. His academic and scientific prestige gave him a challenging platform. His most famous quotation from one of his scientific books, which possibly set him to write his antireligious text is;

'The universe we observe has precisely the same properties we should expect, of these is at bottom, no design, no purpose, no evil and no good, nothing but blind pitiless indifference'.

Thus, in a sentence he attempts to destroy anything we might believe about a world created by God.

Christopher Hitchens, our second unbeliever, spent a great portion of his life in the United States, where he was very successful journalist and an articulate lecturer. He died of cancer and rejected many offers to pray for his soul before he succumbed to his illness. He never recanted his views.

Both authors ridiculed much of the Old Testament; an easy target, as many of the stories were written in an attempt, to explain some of the vital questions in the ancient world. Questions such as; how did the world begin? And why does sin exist? Stories were written in such a way that people could understand at a time when much of the knowledge we now take for granted did not exist.

However, I believe that the works of Dawkins and Hitchens were not without merit. For years the Church was not challenged to the same extent as it is now. Theologians were required to respond to all the assertions made by Dawkins and Hitchens and some of we more humble readers were required to think afresh about what the church taught and what we truly believe.

Did they do more harm than good? The answer must be yes because they destroyed the faith of millions. You could argue that our faith in God was blind but can faith be anything but blind? The church is in decline, but millions still believe that there is evidence of a God and who could argue that the teaching of Jesus made no sense. Millions still believe that his teaching was inspired by God and millions still believe that he was God in human form.

Is life meaningless? Is there a divine power who influences our lives? These are the questions that remain unanswered except in a religious context, and it is up to the church to provide them and rise to the challenge of the unbelievers.
